# Pro-Ject Essential III BT

#### What's the story?

Pro-Ject has an Essential III for everyone: there's a USB version for digital archiving, a phono-stage version for vinyl-intolerant amps, even a speed-changing version for those who can't bear to switch from 33 to 45rpm manually. And there's this one, for streaming to a Bluetooth amp or speaker.

#### Is it any good?

Like every Pro-Ject turntable, this one has it where it counts: low-resonance MDF platter and chassis, aluminium tonearm with Ortofon cartridge, DC motor for pitch stability. It's simple to set up and use — and sounds lushly, lavishly vinyl, with great timing, a beautifully even frequency range, and enough warmth to keep things just as toasty as they need to be. It's enough to make you forget it's using crusty old Bluetooth 3.0.

# Cambridge Alva TT

#### What's the story?

The words 'audiophile' and 'wireless' are seldom seen in the same sentence together, unless the words 'cannot be' are included too. Audiophilia has always included a hairshirt element, a strong suggestion of 'no pain, no gain'. Well, Cambridge is attempting to rewrite that particular rule.

#### Is it any good?

The Alva TT is a sturdy, beautifully made, audiophile–grade direct–drive turntable. Cambridge has added Bluetooth connectivity up to a hi–res apt X HD 24–bit/48kHz quality, which means you can wirelessly stream vinyl to your system at a truly high–end standard. And it's almost a formality to report that it sounds great, with all of that lovely vinyl expertise where warmth, timing and rhythm are concerned.

# Audio-Technica LP60-XBT

#### What's the story?

Never content to leave well enough alone, Audio–Technica has taken a critical look at its popular LP60–BT wireless turntable and given it a thorough going–over for the demanding tastes of 2019. The result is this LP60–XBT — and it's an upgrade well worth waiting for.

#### Is it any good?

AT has upped the Bluetooth standard to apt X 5.0 and improved both tracking and resonance–rejection. The result is a turntable that feels a little lightweight and plasticky, yet manages to include a phono stage, an aluminium platter, plus auto stop/start and speed change. Its wireless performance is very impressive. It's not the punchiest we've ever heard, but overall sound is better than you'd expect for the price.
